June 16, 1969

Mission Board of the Northern Illinois District purchases land in north Palatine for a new congregation.

1970

May 1970

N.I.D. calls Rev. Norbert Kleidon as Missionary-at-Large to north Palatine.

February 7, 1971

First worship service held in basement of Virginia Lake **Elementary School** in Palatine.

(Attendance: 150)

April 22, 1971

First building committee formed.

September 1970

First core group meeting (Attendance: 6)

Nov. 28, 1971 Rev. Norbert Kleidon installed as first pastor. Oct. 10, 1971 Congregation chartered as Prince of Peace Lutheran Church. April 25, 1974 Baptized membership reaches 200. Sept. 26 1971 Groundbreaking ceremonies for the first church Aug. 6, 1972 First worship service in building. the newly constructed Prince of Peace building.

After Don and Joan Peters were married in 1958, and their sons, David and Brian were born, the Peters family needed more space. Joan's sister Winnie and her husband Neal Peterson lived in Rolling Meadows, so Don and Joan bought a lot in the Reseda subdivision in Palatine and moved in 1963. Their last child, Julie was born in 1966. Don worked as an electrical engineer and then in quality control. They were POP founding members, and Don generously shared his memories which have been edited for space:

ur family attended the Missouri Synod church in Palatine. One day, Pastor Kleidon from the Northern Illinois District visited our home and invited us to attend a Bible study in his home. This so-called "Core Group" evolved into the new congregation called the Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod. Norbert Kleidon was a tool-and-die man, who attended seminary, and became our first pastor.

I regret that I have forgotten many people in the "Core Group." But I remember Phyllis & Wayne Peterson and Fred & MaryAnn Ostrem. I was close to Ernie Baker, Roger Groenland and his family, and George Hanson and his wife Margaret. Another George Hanson was musically-gifted and later led our emerging choir.

As the "Core Group" grew, we met at Wayne and Phyllis' house. Then we began to meet in the basement of a school on Rohlwing Road. This time was unforgettable for my family. We would set up a small sanctuary in the basement, hold a full church service, and then take it down after our service. This was a time of bonding for many in our church. Around this time, I met Al LaVanture and we remained friends for many years.

As time passed, we needed more room. We moved our services out of the basement to a gymnasium and had Sunday services there. Plans were made to buy land on the corner of Cunningham and Hicks. The tree nursery on one side was part of this land.

Around this time, Pastor Kleidon initiated an "Evangelism Explosion" teaching program. He was taught how to conduct evangelism calls. He then taught me and others. We



learned by emulating him. We learned a Presentation Plan and prepared personal testimonies. Pastor would present part of the call and we were invited to contribute. I liked this program and continued to participate in the Evangelism Call Program for several years with Phyllis, Ernie, and Al.

Richard Maxwell joined our church and became an important leader of our congregation. Also, around this time, many of us became charter members of Prince of Peace Church. I remember talented pastors that guided us. As I finish this recollection, I would like to mention people who I knew and regard with great admiration:

Dave Penner, Todd Kruse, Richard Maxwell,

John Raley, Al Sittaro, Dick Riffner, Louis & Barb Lawrence, and Joan Peters, my beloved wife.

Easter Sunday April 4, 1987

Groundbreaking on 7,000 square foot addition of classrooms, choir room, fellowship hall/gymnasium, restrooms, storage space, kitchen, and an extended lobby.

May 21, 1989

Rev. Michael Newman, Assistant Pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Owatonna, Minnesota, installed as pastor at Prince of Peace.

October 1988

Prince of Peace partners with Hispanic congregation, La Santisima Trinidad of the Little Village Community of Chicago.


May 1992

September 1998 PEACE Groups ministry launches with 13 groups. **February 1, 1998** Rev. Scott Christenson installed as first Associate Pastor. 1998 Amy Mattes becomes first full-time Director of Student Ministry. June 25, 1995 First worship service in the newly expanded sanctuary.

June 29, 2008 DEI Campaign launched as long-range strategic plan adopted by Voters Assembly. Included plans to plant two new congregations. September 27, 2009 Rev. John Scott installed as Outreach Pastor. 2006 Hope Shawl Ministry launches. First Stephen Ministry training session occurs.




